Melinda then advised that Peter would be impossible to replace but that he had recommended Lois Crosland as the new Sr. Warden and she had asked her and she had accepted.

These past two months were very busy from the preparation and servicing the meals on Thanksgiving to picking your elf hat off the tree to purchasing that just right gift for the person in need to delivering the gifts to the families. I want to thank all who participated in these two truly wonderful outreach projects. It has been a privilege to be part of the St. Andrew's family over the past ten years, and to serve you as Senior Warden over the last five years. I have been most appreciative of your support -- especially in the often-challenging interim period between the retirement of Al Holland as Rector early in 2004 and the calling of Melinda Archer as our new Rector in October 2005.

My heartfelt thanks to all of you for the gift of the beautiful Lay Eucharistic Minister's Kit you presented me in church as we moved into Advent! It is a perfect gift – one that left me at a loss for words that Sunday morning – and one, which will serve me well as my walk continues.

To keep you apprised of my progress as a postulant, I started assisting with the Spanish service at the Church of the Epiphany on the first Sunday in Advent, and expect to integrate more fully into other work there as the New Year unfolds. One of the next steps involves course work, initially studying "online"

Finance Committee

The Finance Committee met on December 14th to go over the proposed budget for 2006. We evaluated what we had and made changes to the Expense side of the budget, which lowered the amount needed in pledges from \$153,000 to \$145,697. To date we have received 61 pledges totaling \$109,342.07 leaving a deficit of \$36,354. A final budget will be presented to the Vestry for their approval at the Vestry Meeting on January 14th."

The additional responsibilities of the Junior Warden are:

1. To serve as the chair of the Buildings, Property and Maintenance Committee
2. To maintain the "Super Vestry" roster.

Please turn your nomination forms in to Lois Crosland by January 14, 2006.

The position of the Secretary of the Vestry/Corporation (one year term), will also be voted upon by the newly elected Vestry at their special meeting immediately following the Annual Meeting. The duties of the Secretary of the Vestry/Corporation is take and publish detailed minutes of each Vestry meeting and to notify vestry members of meetings. If you are interested in this position please let either Melinda or Lois know.

Confirmation, Reaffirmation, Reception Class

"You have to have a room for me!" the ruffled businessman insisted. "See? Here's my confirmation number. I have a confirmation number!"

Nearly midnight on a Tuesday in early December, and there was no room at the inn for that weary traveler, nor for my husband and me waiting in line behind him. A security guard finally drove us to a seedy motel across town.

In "What Shall We Do About Confirmation?" Leonel Mitchell ponders giving up the word "confirmation" altogether. For some Episcopalians, the meaning of confirmation seems as vague as those hotel confirmation numbers, as uncertain as that young security guard driving through midnight. Despite carrying our uncertainties like so much battered luggage, however, ultimately most Episcopalians continue to claim confirmation as both valid and valuable. The opening rubrics of the confirmation service point out that those baptized young are "expected" to be confirmed, and even Mitchell ends up seeing it as "the rite in which those baptized as infants have the opportunity to own the faith in which they have been brought up."

Besides those who have grown up as "cradle Episcopalians," a number of today's confirmands are adults from other traditions, confirming their membership in the Episcopal Church by reaffirming their baptismal vows.

We will have a confirmation class beginning on Thursday evening, January 19, 2006, from 7 p.m. till 8 p.m. and continuing every Thursday evening until the last class being held on Wednesday, March 1st (Ash Wednesday). Classes will be conducted in the sanctuary. We will explore the meaning behind confirmation and what we believe. This class is open to all youths and adults who wish to be confirmed. Ted Warlick has volunteered to lead these classes. To register for the confirmation class, there is a sign up sheet in the narthex of the church and in the parish hall. USING OUR TALENTS OF DISCERNMENT

The Anglican Digest (TAD) reports that* "The makers of a film adaptation of "The Da Vinci Code" will not be allowed to shoot in Westminster Abbey. The abbey said in a statement that it would be inappropriate, as the novel by Dan Brown was 'theologically unsound.'" "We cannot commend or endorse the contentious and wayward religious and historic suggestions made in the book - nor its views of Christianity and the New Testament."

Cheers to Westminster for using discernment and for not falling to secular populism or the money I'm sure was offered. The popular Anne Rice has just released a book purported to be the life of the young Christ during and leaving Egypt. I'm sure this, too, will cause a lot of talk. We need to remember that these books are released in the Fiction category. While they may be interesting action stories, we need to use our talent of discernment and sift the wheat from the chaff. All that is necessary for salvation is found in the Bible and Scriptures. That is just one leg of our "theological" stool. The others are to look at what the church has discerned over the centuries and on our own study and common sense. Remember, the characters in the books were not there and the plot is whatever research the author does for his or her fictional storytelling. (I have read several of Dan Brown's books and Anne Rice's. 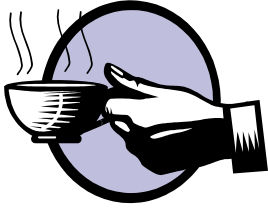
Thank you to all those serving on the Altar Guild during the past year. We would welcome past Altar Guild Members to rejoin our group.

A NEW YEAR

I hope and pray that you had a safe but enjoyable Christmas. Yes, I wrote the "C" word! It seemed everywhere you went this past Christmas that "Christ" was being taken out of Christmas. I visited many of the department stores and really had to look for anything that had anything to do with Christ and the "real" Christmas. It was very sad to me that America is more and more taking away any semblance of God from our eyes and ears. I could go on and on about this but this is not the place for a soap box.

I came across an email from a friend that I would like to share with you. These are principles that will change your way of thinking positively and achieving goals. Seven steps that will help you achieve your dreams:

1. Help people figure out **what they want!**

It should be specific and should be written down in a positive way...in other words you don't want to write down what you don't want, but rather what you **DO WANT!**

2. Think with Ink!

There is a physically measurable advantage to **WRITING THINGS DOWN!** Your brain will record and enable you to recall the things that are important (more easily). If you're not **writing things down**, you're putting yourself at a disadvantage!

3. Set a Deadline

Most everyone works better when their goal is not 'open-ended'! If you **give yourself a deadline**, then your **mind will work** toward **getting it done** by that deadline!

4. List the things that you'll need to reach your goals.

It would be helpful to **write down** what you might have **to give up...temporarily!** It would be necessary to better manage your time. It is a disadvantage to write down the **FEARS** you'll **HAVE to OVERCOME!**

5. Organize the List into a Plan!

Here is where that **'think with ink'** step is helpful...remember, **if it's not written down, it's not a 'goal'**, it's just a dream.

6. Take **'ACTION'** Steps -- **DAILY!**

If you're implementing and executing **'your written plan,'** you'll have infinitely better results! You'll have to overcome some of your fears, and you'll have to learn to manage your time. Some of the things you do will need to be attempted on a **'Trial and Error!'** basis...It's really the **only way to succeed...LEARN by DOING!** If you work at these things on a DAILY BASIS, you'll have quicker and better results!

7. Evaluate Your Results.

At the end of each day...**evaluate your results**. This is not a time to be 'hard on yourself', but the necessary process to **review and improve!** Looking at what you've done and looking at ways to improve will enable you to **Master Your Craft!**

I use a day planner for many years and thought that once I retired that I could retire it also. I was wrong on that one. I had to start using it again and it really has helped me this past year to keep focused on the things that really matter. I have been successful on certain things and not successful on others. I find that I have less time than what I previously had. I wish someone would explain that one to me and tell me where the time went too.

In your plans for the New Year please take some time to consider helping by volunteering with the St. Andrew's Coffee Hour Ministry. This is a group of volunteers who come together each Sunday morning to prepare your cup of coffee. There is a sign up sheet available in the Parish Hall if you wish to help with this ministry.

NEWS FROM THE HISPANIC MINISTRY

~Dec. 28, 2005

First off, we would like to wish everyone a very merry Christmas and a happy New Year. This month has been very busy for all of us. All of the Christmas preparations do indeed take time to put into place. We would like to give a huge thanks to the Altar Guild, because they do so much stuff for us and hardly any is recognized.

The Hispanic service has had many things this month. First starting with the special service dedicated to Our Lady of Guadalupe. Everything, I mean everything was really special. The music was different, the decorations, everything was special. For this service, we had a Mariachi band come and play. This band was composed of member of our own parish. The instrumental section was made up of two trumpets, two violins, a flute, a clarinet, a guitar, a bass. The choir composed the voices of the band. Also, for the Sermon, some of the Sunday school students reenacted the apparition of our Lady of Guadalupe to St. Juan Diego in the hill of Tepeyac in the year 1492. They played many traditional Mexican Christmas songs, along with many traditional Christmas songs. It was a very happy service commemorating the birth of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. This time however, we didn't do a Christmas play with real live actors. This year's Christmas play was a puppet play. The main characters in this play were puppets Miguel and Chalo. It was hilarious, yet educational directed to the children of the service followed by a Sermon directed to the adults.

Again, this month was full of special services. They were three weeks in a row. No break at all. It was indeed a very busy month for our little church. We would like to give huge thanks also to Enrique, our music master for doing all these special services from scratch. FEED THE HOMELESS
