Thank you for electing me Jr. Warden. I realize the full responsibility of the position of Jr. Warden. This is our church home therefore we all have a degree of responsibility not just the person with the title. In other words, I need your help and participation so we have a beautiful and well functioning church home just as you would your own home.

I am asking for volunteer team leaders for areas of upkeep on the church property. Team leaders will form their own teams to maintain the upkeep on a weekly basis. Areas of upkeep are: Grounds beautification-which will make sure the grounds are clear of trash and debris and that graffiti is cleaned off property. Groundskeeper-will take care of the mowing of grass and trimming bushes. Sprinkler system-repairing sprinkler heads and monitoring proper function. Building maintained-replacing light bulbs, plumbing repairs, AC/Heating filter replacement and upkeep of the AC units and electrical problems. If you are willing to be a team leader please contact me.

We have a communications box in the Narthex for repairs needed for maintaining the church buildings and grounds. If you have noticed something in need of repair, please write the problem down and place it in the box. (Tablet and pen will be provided at the box site.) It will be checked weekly by the Jr. Warden and will be distributed to the proper team leader. All repairs will be handled by priority. If there is an emergency in regards to the buildings or grounds, please contact the Jr. Warden at home.

I have been approached on several occasions about the sprinkler system not working. May I reassure you it will be up and running soon.

Thank you for your help and support. Together we can have an attractive and well-maintained church home.

Stewardship

The season of Lent, one of the most Holy times of the church, is here. What it means is usually a little different to each of us. As Christians we know that it is a time of preparation for the gift of the Cross and Resurrection. It is observed for 40 days. Forty is a significant number in the Holy Bible—Moses led the Israelites through the desert for 40 years, Christ fasted and was tempted for 40 days to name a couple. As stewards of the time, treasure, and talent that God has given to us, what will we do with our 40 days? Give up chocolate? Quit smoking? Have meatless Friday's? The list sounds a little like New Year's Resolutions doesn't it and by now most of them have probably fallen by the wayside. Maybe it's time to look at Lent differently by looking inside ourselves. We could spend an extra 40 minutes a day or week in studying scripture or reading some C. S. Lewis or the Book of Common Prayer. Maybe we could spend our 40 minutes in prayer and meditation or make a weekly list of 40 things we are grateful for. We could participate in (not just attend) the Tuesday Women's Bible Study or the Wednesday night study (they're a little longer than 40 minutes, but doesn't Christ deserve a little extra). How about an extra \$40 donation to the church or a food bank or other group that reaches out to those Christ served. We might even find that we can save that much a little at a time and do it more than once—scary thought eh, that God does provide when we stretch a little. Or some hours volunteering to help at church—pick up some trash, help at coffee hour, etc. These are just some ideas. And they are personal sacrifices of time, talent, and treasure. I'm sure you can find your own special way to honor Christ during this time. And remember His words about your countenance when fasting along with His words in Matthew 6. It is a joyous and wondrous thing to serve the Lord. Praise God we can do it openly and without fear—not all are so blessed.

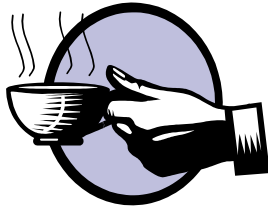

The Lenten Season

Lent is a forty-day season of preparation for the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ on Easter Sunday. The season begins with Ash Wednesday, when pastors mark the foreheads of Christians with ashes as a reminder that we are created from dust and to dust we shall return.

During Lent we follow Jesus from his adult ministry through his suffering during Holy Week and his crucifixion and death on Good Friday. And we read the Psalms that foretell what would happen during that week.

Holy Week begins with Palm Sunday, also called Sunday of the Passion, and continues through Holy Thursday (when Holy Communion was instituted at the Last Supper) and Good Friday, when Jesus was tried, crucified, and buried.

Because the Last Supper was celebrated during the Feast of the Passover, which is calculated on the phases of the moon, Easter is called a movable feast. Lent is scheduled backwards from Easter. Easter falls on the first Sunday after the full moon after the spring equinox. The forty days of fasting and penitence during Lent do not include Sundays. Christians always celebrate Sunday as the day Jesus rose from the dead, so it is never a day of fasting.

Many Northern Europeans celebrate the day before Ash Wednesday, **mardi gras** (French for Fat Tuesday, also called Shrove Tuesday), by eating up everything good in the house that medieval Christians believed was inappropriate to eat during Lent (eggs, butter, cream, meat). This celebration has expanded into all sorts of festivals all over the world, although most modern Christians do eat some - or all - of those foods during Lent.

Lent is a time of stripping down to essentials, as each Christian focuses on his or her individual relationship with God. It is a time when Christians remember our baptisms, when Jesus washed away our sins, giving us newness of life to celebrate in the triumph of Palm Sunday and the glory of Easter.

Because Lent is a time of letting go of the bondage of sin, it is also a time of celebrating the freedom from the bondage of slavery. At the Feast of the Passover, all Jews give thanks for their freedom from the captivity of the Egyptians.

The St. Andrew's Coffee Hour Ministry is seeking volunteers. Consider this ministry as a way you can serve God with your talents. There is a sign up sheet available in the Parish Hall if you wish to help with this ministry.

Also, don't be in such a hurry after the 8 a.m. and the 9 a.m. worship services to get on with your Sunday activities. We welcome everyone to come and fellowship with us, enjoy each other's company and energize ourselves and reflect on God's blessings in our lives.

Ted Warlick (King of the Kitchen) heads up the Coffee Hour Ministry. If you are interested in becoming a part of this ministry please see Ted or call him at home. Volunteers are scheduled on a rotating three to four month cycle.

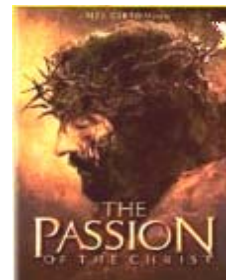
This is a reminder for everyone: we request monetary donations to offset the cost of the coffee and donuts. Baskets are available in the Parish Hall to place your donations.

On January 8th through January 11th, 2006 I was able to attend our Regional IX AGO (American Guild of Organists) Convention held in Las Vegas, NV. Our convention hotel was based in Henderson which is South of Vegas and the airport where we were bused to all the recitals and workshops. I'd like to share some of these highlights with you as it is a wonderful experience for any church musician to have exposure and involvement with these events which are not only an enhancement for learning but also generate a musical excitement to improve one's keyboard skills. Here is a brief overview of my schedule:

- Jan 9th Opening Convocation/Worship at Community Lutheran Church (Fred Swan was one of the organists at this Worship service)
- Jan 9th Langlais: His Life and Works – Multi-media presentation by Dr. Ann Labounsky at Community Lutheran Church (Langlais was a very famous French composer/organist)
- Jan 9th Concert by Emma Lou Diemer (composer and performer) at UNLV Campus on the newly installed Rudolpf von Beckerath pipe organ.
- Jan 9th Mozart and Organ - Frances Nobert and Paul Hesselink
- Jan 9th Workshop – The Organ in Contemporary Worship (Community Lutheran Church)
- Jan 10th Concert – Chelsea Chen at UNLV (young and very technical and powerful organist)
- Jan 10th Workshop – Preparing for the Langlais Centenary
- Jan 10th Back to UNLV and a live broadcast of Pipe Dreams (radio show): Around Bach ... which featured multiple organists performing Bach pieces and one of these performers was Dr. Mark Ramsey from our Phoenix Ago Chapter.
- Jan 10th Workshop – Meet the Compers – Emma Lou Diemer (very fascinating person)
- Jan 10th Concert – Murray/Lohuis Duo, Violin and Organ at UNLV
- Jan 11th Anatomy of an Organ Building Project (UNLV pipe organ project was used as the subject example)
- Jan 11th Concert – Nevada School of Arts, Violin Ensemble at UNLV
- Jan 11th Concert – Millennia Too – Barrett and Luedecke/Organ and Oboe/English Horn at All Saints Episcopal Church
- Jan 11th Concert – University Children's Chorale at L.D.S. Stak Center
- Jan 11th Concert – Dr. Ann Labounsky at UNLV

There was also an exhibit room at the hotel where vendors had spaces set up for music, organs, etc. for the convention goes to browse on their free time. Free time at these events is so limited as the schedules are extremely hectic and sometimes overwhelming but the end result is very rewarding for the attendee.

NEWS FROM THE HISPANIC MINISTRY

~March 6, 2006

Greetings! As we all know, we are now in the season of Lent. Lent is a season that lasts forty days, which represents the forty days Jesus spent in the desert being tempted by Satan. Lent is usually a slow season for the church. However, at the end of Lent is Holy Week. It all begins with Palm Sunday and lasts all the way to Easter Sunday. Holy Week is a very important season. It also involves much work from all the committees of the church, especially for the Altar Guild. They will be one of, if not the busiest of all the groups. I would like to throw a huge thanks to them. If it weren't for our Altar Guild, we wouldn't be able to do all the things that we want to. None of the services would ever run smoothly without them.

Along with all the preparations for the Easter, we also have many special services that the Hispanic Ministry will be holding. We have special services for First Communion and Baptisms. These services are solely for these purposes. On April 15, we will be holding a special service for Baptisms at 4 o'clock pm. Due to the amount of students enrolled in the First Communion classes, the services will be divided into two groups. The first group will do their First Communion on April 16 at 12 o'clock pm. The second group will do their First Communion on April 23 at 12 o'clock pm.

One of our own parish members was just inducted into a diocesan wide group called the Daughters of the King. Dulce Carmona was inducted into this group on Sunday, March 4, 2006 at San Pablo's Episcopal Church. An inducting service was held at this church, in which Bishop Smith presided. This group consists of Episcopal Women who dedicate time and effort to serve the church and their parishes. This is also a prayer group for these women. Another group, similar to the Daughters of the King, only its only parish wide, called Episcopal Church Women (ECW), held their first meeting the same Sunday. Evelyn Ruiz-Esparza was elected president of the group. The ECW is similar to the Daughters of the King. They do prayer, and help other women with special needs.

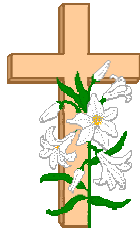

Resurrection Rolls

(Great family project) Recipe provided by Ted Warlick

- 1 package Crescent rolls
- melted butter
- large marshmallows
- cinnamon
- sugar

Preheat oven to 350 degrees.

Give each child a triangle of crescent rolls.

The crescent roll represents the cloth that Jesus was wrapped in.

Give each child a marshmallow.

This represents Jesus and His purity.

Have child dip the marshmallow in melted butter.

This represents the oils of embalming.

Dip the buttered marshmallow in the cinnamon and sugar.

This represents the spices used to anoint the body of Jesus.

Wrap the coated marshmallow tightly in the crescent roll

(not like a typical crescent roll up, but bring the sides up and seal the marshmallow inside)

This represents the wrapping of Jesus' body after death.

Place in a 350 degree oven for 10 to 12 minutes.

The oven represents the tomb *(pretend like it was 3 days and nights!)*

When the rolls have cooled slightly, the children can open their rolls (cloths) and discover that Jesus is no longer there,

HE IS RISEN!

The marshmallow melts and the crescent roll is puffed up,
but like the tomb - **IT IS EMPTY!**



The perfect boiled egg actually is not boiled at all. Boiling the egg makes the protein unpleasantly rubbery and can give a nasty green cast to the outer layer of the yolk. Follow this foolproof method for a firm but tender white and a smooth, butter-yellow yolk--a truly excellent egg:

- To prevent cracking during cooking, prick the larger end of the egg with a pin. This provides an escape hatch for the air trapped there.
- Place eggs in a deep saucepan in a single layer. Pour in enough water to cover eggs by 1 inch.
- Set the saucepan over heat and then bring the water just to the boil.
- Immediately remove the saucepan from the heat and place a cover on top.
- Let the eggs sit for 15 minutes.

Place the eggs in a bowl of ice water for 4 minutes to cool, then refrigerate.
