From the Rector

What is a Diocesan Convention?

The Episcopal Church is part of the Anglican Communion and therefore has a system of representation and voting at all levels.

At the Parish level: Each parish elects members to the vestry and delegates to the Diocesan Convention each year at the Annual Parish Meeting that is held right after the first of the year. This is also an opportunity to find out what is going on, to approve the budget and to ask questions of concern about the Parish.

On the Diocesan level: There is a convention every fall to elect clergy and laity to represent the parishes and missions in the Diocese on the Standing Committee, Executive Council and at the Provincial and National levels. The delegates that were elected at the Parish level, along with the clergy of the Diocese, vote at these elections, approve the budget and also vote on matters concerning the Diocese. They have the opportunity to question items that come up for discussion or vote.

At the Provincial level: The Episcopal Church USA is divided into 9 provinces. We belong to Province 8. There is a Provincial Synod held where elected representatives (clergy and lay) from the dioceses of the Province can discuss and vote on matters concerning the Province.

At the National level: Every 3 years there is a General Convention where clergy and laity from all the dioceses of the Episcopal Church USA meet to discuss and vote on matters of concern for the Episcopal Church USA. Every 9 years a new Presiding Bishop is elected. This meeting usually takes place in June and the newly elected Presiding Bishop, the Rt. Rev. Katharine Jefferts Schori, will be consecrated in November

We have just completed our diocesan convention here last weekend. I thought you all might like to know how the internal composition of the Episcopal Church is structured and how decisions are made at every level.

¿Qué es una Convención Diocesana?

La Iglesia Episcopal forma parte de la Comunión anglicana por lo tanto tiene un sistema de la representación y votando a cada nivel.

En el nivel de Parroquia: Cada parroquia elige a miembros a la junta parroquial y delegados a la Convención Diocesana cada año en la Reunión Anual de Parroquia que tiene lugar en el primer mes del año. Esto es también una oportunidad de averiguar lo que pasa, para aprobar el presupuesto y para hacer preguntas acerca de la vida de la Parroquia.

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En el nivel Diocesana: Hay una convención cada otoño para elegir el clero y el laicado para representar las parroquias y las misiones en la Diócesis en el Comité Consejero, el Concilio Ejecutivo y en los niveles Provinciales y Nacionales. Los delegados que se eligieron en el nivel de Parroquia, junto con el clero de la diócesis, votan en estas elecciones, aprueba el presupuesto y también votan en asuntos con respecto a la Diócesis. Ellos tienen la oportunidad de cuestionar artículos que surgen para discusión o el voto

En el nivel Provincial: La Iglesia Episcopal en EEUU se divide en 9 provincias. Pertenece a la Provincia 8. Hay un Sínodo Provincial que elige a representantes (del clero y de los laicos) de las diócesis de la Provincia puede discutir y votar en asuntos con respecto a la Provincia.

En el nivel Nacional: Hay cada 3 años una Convención General donde clero y laicado de todas las diócesis de la Iglesia Episcopal en EEUU encuentran discutir y votar en preocupaciones para la Iglesia Episcopal en EEUU. Cada 9 años un Nuevo Obispo Presidente es elegido. Esta reunión sucede generalmente en junio, y nuestra elegida nuevamente Obispo Presidente se llama La Rev. Katharine Jefferts Schori. Ella será consagrada en noviembre.

Hemos ya terminado nuestra convención el fin de semana pasada. Es una poca información para explicar la estructura interna de la Iglesia, y también como se hacen las decisiones.

Now that summer has past and cooler days are here I want to welcome back all those who escaped to the mountains for the summer as well as our winter visitors. It is great to have you all back amongst us.

St. Andrew's had eight delegates (clergy, wardens and 4 elected representatives) attend the Diocesan Convention on Friday and Saturday, October 20 and 21 where the theme was "It's Tool Time". Bishop Smith focused on the fact that God has given us what is needed to build the church and that at times we need to find the tools to do the job. There are times that the tools that are needed don't exist in our own parishes but they may in others and that is when it is important to share our gifts. There were seven workshops from which the delegates could choose to attend. Of the seven, the delegates from St. Andrew's attended: *Congregational Development* which provided tools for church growth and development; *Outreach and Community Involvement* which provided tools for discerning opportunities to move out into the community addressing the needs of others; *Reaching the Unchurched* which provided the tools for growing our congregations with new members; *Stewardship and Finance* which provided tools for developing and strengthening the stewardship and fundraising efforts of our congregation and *Worship and Liturgy* which provided tools for enhancing our worship and liturgy style. As you can see these workshops were pretty much centered around church growth and development which is something that is on the minds of the staff and Vestry. One question that often comes up is "How do we get more people in the pews?" Do you know someone, a neighbor, friend, family member who doesn't attend church or may be looking for a new church home? If so, why not invite them to come to church with you on a Sunday or to one of the Bible Study groups during the week. If you know of someone that you haven't seen in church in a while why not give them a wellness call to make sure they are okay, let them know that they are missed and invite them to rejoin us on a Sunday.

The Story of the Virgin of Guadalupe

The story of the virgin of Guadalupe tells of a poor Indian named Juan Diego who had become a Christian. One day in 1531, the story says, a beautiful dark-skinned lady appeared suddenly before him on a mountain trail. She told him that she has come to take care of his people and asked him to the Bishop believed. He built a church in honor of the Virgin at the spot where she stood. Juan Diego was certain that she was a Christian saint, but the Bishop would not believe that a saint had appeared to a poor Indian Boy. Again and again, Juan Diego tried to persuade the Bishop, but without success. When he confessed to the Virgin that he could not make the bishop believe, lovely roses sprang up on the barren hillside. The Virgin said they were a token for the Bishop, and Juan Diego wrapped them in his cape and carried them away. When he appeared before the Bishop and opened his cape to show the roses, a marvelous picture of the Virgin appeared on the shabby cloth. Then, at last, the Bishop believed. He built a church in honor of the Virgin at the spot where Juan Diego had seen her.

The Virgin of Guadalupe, as she is called, is well loved throughout Mexico. The church that is her shrine is in Mexico City. On December 12, Catholics in all the Americas and especially those in Mexico, commemorate the vision in 1531 of Our Lady of Guadalupe to a poor Indian named Juan Diego.

La Historia de la Virgen de Guadalupe

La historia de la Virgen de Guadalupe habla de un indio humilde llamado Juan Diego, quien se había convertido en Cristiano. La historia relata que, en 1531, una hermosa señora morena a pareció de repente ante él en la vereda de la montaña. Le dijo que venía a cuidar a su gente y le pidió que le dijera al Obispo que edificara una iglesia en el lugar donde ella se había aparecido.

Juan Diego estaba seguro que ella era una santa Cristian a, pero el Obispo no creyó que una santa se le hubiera aparecido a aquel humilde indio. Varian veces Juan Diego trató de persuadir

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al Obispo, pero no tuvo éxito. Cuando le confesó a la Virgen que no podía hacerlo creer, rosas hermosas brotaron en la estéril ladera. La Virgen le dijo que eran un regalo para el Obispo, y Juan Diego las envolvió en su manta y se las llevó. Cuando se presentó ante el Obispo, abrió su manta para enseñarle las rosas, un cuadro maravilloso de la Virgen apareció en la tela gastada de su tilma. Hasta entonces el Obispo creyó. Edificó una iglesia en honor de la Virgen en el lugar donde Juan Diego la había visto.

La Virgen de Guadalupe, como la llamamos, es querida por todo México. La iglesia del Cerro del Tepeyac, donde se le apareció a Juan Diego, está en la Ciudad de México. El día 12 de diciembre los Católicos en toda América, y especialmente los mexicanos, conmemoran la aparición de Nuestra Señora de Guadalupe en 1531 al indio Juan Diego.

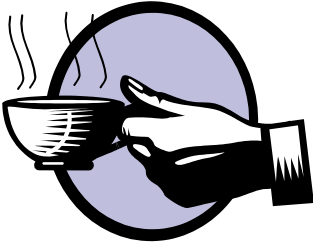

Sunday's Competing Demands

The Living Church, October 22, 2006

On a recent Sunday morning in the city where this magazine is published, thousands of people on their way to church were forced to find alternate routes because a sizable portion of the city's downtown was blocked. There was a run and walk that morning, a worthwhile event for charity that attracted thousands of participants. Such events are common these days in most communities, but when one realizes the popularity of youth soccer and other team sports, golf, tennis, and other pastimes, it adds up to a problem.

It is difficult enough for our churches to attract people these days, but when one considers all the other attractions available on Sunday mornings, perhaps it's a wonder that church attendance is at its current levels. None of the aforementioned events is new. Churches have been competing with them for years. But at a time when so much is being made of average Sunday attendance, perhaps we need to ask, why Sunday morning?

To their credit, some churches have decided not to fight this battle and have offered optional service times. Saturday evenings have been a regular time of worship in many churches and now we have noticed a growing number offering a celebration of the Eucharist on Sunday evenings. In large congregations, participants in sports programs may be able to find a weekday service as an alternative, but it's not the same. Those who are not present on Sunday mornings fail to honor the Sabbath and also miss the primary opportunities for Christian education. Engaging in fellowship with other Christians also may be less effective than on a Sunday morning. Participating in sports and recreational activities is good for most of us, but when it interferes with our duty to come together week by week for corporate worship, it needs to be addressed.
